Readings for Sunday: Wisdom 1.16-2.1, 12-22; James 3.13-4.3, 7-8a; Mark 9.30-37

The pandemic has impacted us hugely in so many areas of our lives. One of the ways in which I've seen it hit us hard here in Fairford is our psychological well-being. Isolation and a steady stream of bad news about so much going on in the world: sickness, disaster, war, climate change, growing authoritarianism... These affect how we think about the world, about our lives, and about ourselves, and can very well drag us down into despair. The thought process is simple – I'm so small, and can do so little. The world is huge and broken. There's nothing I can do. There's no hope. Perhaps alongside that despair we can slide into cynicism and nihilism – 'everything is twisted in the end. Why bother?'

You can hear that mind-set repeated, or perhaps prefigured is a better word, loud and clear from the 2nd century BC, and the book of Wisdom. Listen to what these people had to say, and tell me you can't hear it echoed today: "Short and sorrowful is our life, and there is no remedy when a life comes to its end, and no one has been known to return from Hades." Their response was cynical aggression – 'How dare someone try to tell us that there might be hope or purpose in the world. We'll teach them how stupid and wrong they are.'

We look to Jesus, the righteous one who attracted just this anger and aggression, and suffered the pain and death that was the culmination of human despair and cynicism. And when we look to him we see something greater and more powerful than all that darkness and bleak hopelessness. Jesus offers us another way. Against that darkness we are called to be something surprising and strange. We are asked to be gentle, welcoming. We are asked to no longer be caught up in our own importance and standing, but concerned only to embrace and build up others.

We don't need to hide from the truth. Yes, there is a lot wrong in the world right now. There are many big problems that will need a great deal of work to correct. But our lives are important. And our relationships, our encounters, how we use our time and resources, will make a tremendous difference to the people around us – to our community and our town. We are not powerless.

My prayer is that, holding on to Jesus example and his promise of 'strength for today and bright hope for tomorrow', we can begin to make that difference.

Reduction in COVID restrictions

- Masks will still be encouraged, but not mandated.
- Coffee will be served after the service in the Community Centre.

ONLINE PRAYER AND WORSHIP

Suggestion from Rev'd Denise to help you in your prayer life.

Over the past weeks I have found the 'Lectio 365' App (which is available to be downloaded for free on both Android and Apple platforms) helpful in my prayer times. It was devised by Pete Grieg (of 24/7 prayer) and focuses on the pattern of P.R.A.Y. (Pause, Reflect/Rejoice, Ask, Yield) as a way of entering into God's presence. Each day's devotion is about 10 minutes long and can be either read or listened to and is a great way to start or end the day.

A less than complimentary view of Fairford and its Church – you can't please everyone!

We are so used to hearing much praise heaped on Fairford while the church visitors' book attests to a world-wide admiration for the beauty of St Mary's such that we assume everyone feels the same. No so! In 1932, Edward Hutton published his 'Highways and Byways in Gloucestershire'. He travelled widely in the county and formed decided opinions. He arrived in Fairford having been impressed by Kempford.

"Now whether it was that I had fallen in love with Kempford and was jealous of all other places, or whether I was prejudiced by its fame, I know not, but it was as I feared, and Fairford seemed a poor exchange for Kempford, the Coln and the Thames".

Having begun on describing the town's reputation Mr Hutton set about the church with relish.

"I confess I found the church uninteresting... and I thought the glass ugly enough to be what it is not, a local product... It is an irony that when the vandalism began at the Reformation and was renewed by the Puritans so much old glass of the thirteenth and fourteenth centuries was lost – and the ugly stuff here was saved. It goes to show how poor we must be in really fine glass when we can rave about the pallid, ugly washed out stuff here. If you could see what glass can be, go to Chartres, Sens, Troyes, Auxerre and a hundred others, and have whole cathedrals full of the most glorious and beautiful work of a better time than the end of the fifteenth century,'

With a final shrug he leaves the town, dismissing it with a contemptuous, "I went on to Lechlade, and forgot Fairford." Edward Hutton's dyspeptic view is fortunately not very widely shared.

Report from a Foundation Governor- St Mary's C of E Primary School, Fairford

I was appointed a Foundation Governor in October 2020 and after Gloucestershire County Council's due diligence (on me) had been completed I attended my first Governor's meeting on 17th November 2020. That meeting and subsequent meetings were held remotely by Zoom and very properly no visits to the school were permitted.

On Tuesday 15th September I went into the school to attend my first face to face meeting with staff and fellow governors. I felt my post as governor had gone "live" and it was good to be in the same room as others attending the meeting.

The care taken by the school during the pandemic to protect children and staff has really paid off. All schools have been affected by the pandemic but the steps taken by the school and compliance by children and parents have meant that Fairford's primary school has been much less affected than many other schools.

The high quality of the school's teaching and support staff is a real source of pride for a Foundation Governor.
