Sunday readings: Genesis 17.1-7, 15-16; Roman 4.13-end; Mark 8.31-end

As we move into the season of Lent we're encouraged to think about those pillars of our relationship with God – to spend time truly reflecting on how and why we think and act as we do, and to get a firmer grasp on our journey forwards with Jesus.

This Sunday we are asked to think about the concept of 'faith'. What does that mean for us, and how does it look in our own lives? We often hear the exhortation to 'have faith' in Jesus, but sometimes that can feel like a very fuzzy concept. What does that actually *mean*?

In our Scriptures we are given two connected examples – what faith looked like for Abraham when God first formed a covenant with him, and then how that faith of Abraham can be understood as applying to those who are not the blood descendants that God promised to him as part of that covenant. In our Genesis reading, God binds himself and Abraham together, in acceptance and recognition of Abraham's own faith. Abraham was willing to let go all the things he knew in his life, to travel to a far unknown country, even to believe the outlandish promise from God that Abraham, a 99 year old man, could have a son with his barren wife. Abraham believed nothing was impossible for God, and committed to follow and trust in him.

This faith, Paul tells us in our Romans reading, was what was 'reckoned to him as righteousness'. And this faith is what we who follow Jesus have. This faith has nothing to do with the Law (since that didn't even exist in Abraham's time), and it has nothing to do with our ethnicity (Abraham was the first) – but has everything to do with how we choose to shape and live our lives. Faith is a lived commitment to what we assent to with our minds and our lips.

And it is this faith that Jesus points us, and his disciples, towards in our reading from Mark's gospel. Peter found the truth Jesus was revealing to be too hard to deal with, and pushed back, and Jesus came down on him hard. Faith isn't easy. It isn't supposed to be. You will see and be asked to cope with things that are very hard indeed. But it is in your response to those challenges that your faith will shine through. 'Take up your cross,' Jesus says. Not just once, but at the start of every day. How will you live today, knowing what Jesus showed and taught. How will you choose to live out your faith? How will you love and serve your neighbour? How will you love God with everything that is in you?

Faith is lived. What will your faith look like this week?



### **From Alison Hobson**

*From the Parish News January 1889*

My dear Parishioners

You have indeed given a hearty welcome to the Parish Magazines. More than 190 copies have been ordered; 59 at 2/6 a year and the rest at 1d a month. This would mean a loss of about 1/- every month; but if our local tradesmen will continue to advertise in the Magazine, there will be no difficulty in meeting the cost of the publication. It is not a very common thing for a Parish Magazine to pay its way, except in large towns, where 500-1000 copies are sold. In most parishes you find in the December number's wail from the editor explaining that the Magazine account shows a balance on the wrong side of £4 or £5 and he will be glad if his benevolent readers will send in subscriptions to help him meet the deficit. Thanks to our half-crown subscribers and our enterprising tradespeople we shall avoid that here. Next January, if all is well, I hope you will see a state of accounts showing a good balance on the right side.

The type of this first number will be kept up till January 14<sup>th</sup> so that we can issue a Second Edition if necessary. Up to that date, any parishioners who apply to me will be able to secure a copy of the January number; but after January 14<sup>th</sup>, the type will be distributed and no more copies will be obtainable.

Those who are taking in the Magazine at 1d a month may either pay for the whole year in advance, or pay for each number as they receive it, whichever they prefer. If

the monthly numbers are kept clean, they will for a nice volume when bound up at the end of the year. The cost of binding will be 1/6.

Again thanking you for the liberal support you have given to the Magazine, with all good wishes for the New Year
